With Advent Sunday we begin a new liturgical year - so may I begin by wishing you very happy new year!

The Church year is often presented as a linear progression which works through from the beginning of the year on Advent Sunday until it ends with the Feast of Christ the King. At school we were taught a useful acronym to help us remember the order of the different feasts and observances of the liturgical year.

The initials **ACE LEAPT** standing for the seasons:

Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Ascension, Pentecost, Trinity.

In reality neither the life of the Church nor our own lives progress in such a simple fashion. Each of the Church's seasons points to something which we should carry with us through and beyond its allotted place in the calendar. The spirit of self-examination and penitence on which Lent focuses, for example, should be a least an element of our everyday life. The powerful mystery of Christ's resurrection and our sharing in it, which is the focus of Easter, is something which we commemorate every Sunday, and is a universal truth which, though rooted in history, transcends the bounds of time and space.

In this light Advent is much more than a preparation for Christmas. Of course, during Advent, we look to the coming of Christ at Christmas - Christ's 'advent,' but Advent calls us to examine some deep and difficult concepts. The traditional themes of Advent are Death, Judgement, Heaven and Hell - tricky questions to consider at any time of year, and definitely an interesting juxtaposition to the commercialism and glitter of much of our Christmas preparation! Of course, these are questions with which we wrestle all the time. For example, these past months have made us examine our relationship with life and death in a new way, as COVID 19 has presented challenges for the medical profession, the caring services, and the Church, as well as for everyone in their homes and everyday lives.

Advent calls us from darkness to light - and the light into which we are called is Christ, who illuminates not only Christmas and Easter, and all the other joyful festivals, but also, Lent and Passiontide. Christ's light shines in our darkest times. Indeed, it can be darkness which allows us to see that the light is shining.

The new beginning with which Advent presents us is an opportunity to connect afresh with the eternal truths - God's love, and the hope offered to us in Christ. It is also a great opportunity to take a fresh look at our faith, learn and ask questions about God and our faith.

In January we will begin a **Christian Basics Course (see page 7)** which will be an opportunity for those who are new to faith, or those who want to refresh their knowledge, can meet to do just that. As we often say, there are no stupid questions - only opportunities to learn!

I recently heard this story of a yacht club, situated beside a small harbour which was well used by boating enthusiasts. Being well frequented and popular with sailors its facilities had become a bit worn. But it was homely and convivial and welcoming and sailors loved to come in and relax after a day on the sea.

A new management committee was elected who decided to refurbish the clubhouse – which they did in style. Solid wood furnishings replaced plywood veneer. The floor was laid with expensive carpets and plush upholstered chairs replaced the rather shabby and cracked faux leather seating. A new chef and bar staff were appointed.

Everyone admitted it was a lovely job, but then the committee introduced new rules about the use of the clubhouse and who would be allowed in and in what attire. The cost of food and drink went up to pay for new staff and to offset the cost of redecoration.

Soon it was less and less used. It had lost its homeliness and relaxed atmosphere. It no longer appealed to the sailors who used the harbour. It was a beautiful building but before long it was empty. It had turned in on itself.

Next year our 275th anniversary of the consecration of the present St Peter's is a wonderful opportunity for us a church to reach out to the community of Formby and to open our doors in welcome for the many events that have been organised – see page 6 for the details for your 2022 diary.

We are so fortunate to have a beautiful church with its unique blend of Georgian and Gothic (Victorian) architecture; a church which has been and is carefully and lovingly maintained and enhanced over the years.

We want its doors wide open next year to invite and welcome in the people of Formby and beyond and for them to celebrate with us this important milestone in the history of Formby's first parish church.



The 275 committee has been working hard to organise a programme to suit all ages and interests. We have prepared a welcome leaflet for every visitor which, as well as advertising the programme of events, contains a short history of St Peter's and what to look for as they walk around the church.

ST PETER'S 275 CELEBRATIONS

The year 2022 marks the 275th anniversary of the consecration of St Peter's Church.

The origins of St. Peter's can be traced back to the 12th century when a chapel existed near the sea. The chapel was destroyed in a storm in 1739, and the decision was taken to build a replacement church further inland – the site of the present church, opposite Church Cottage which was then an inn.

A committee has been meeting throughout 2021 to plan a year of celebration for this milestone in our history.



CHRISTIAN BASICS

In January we are going to have a Christian Basics Course.

Maybe you have started coming to St Peter's and would like to know more about faith. Maybe you have had your child baptised. Maybe you just want to know what Christianity is all about. Or maybe you want a refresher course or are thinking about Confirmation.

Whatever the reason you will be welcome. No previous knowledge is required, just an interest to know more about the basics of our faith. No group discussions though an opportunity to ask questions if you wish.

The four topics will be:-

God & Jesus; The Bible; Baptism & Holy Communion

The root meaning of religion is 'relationship' – a relationship with God. We will learn more about God as we look at Jesus, read the Bible and discuss the Sacraments, especially Baptism and the Eucharist.

The session will be light and informal, but, hopefully, informative, and will be held in the Bier House (beside the church gate), on Mondays 17th, 24th and in Church on 31st January at 7.30pm. No need to book, just come along.






The Lonely Tower

Much of our Christian tradition comes from the Victorian period which emphasised the family gathering, a good meal, children delighted and the move to church. So many pictures convey all these values and they are fully represented in Christmas cards. Many Christmas cards are chosen to endorse these Christian values.

It was the Victorians who ensured that the books for children and the periodicals of that period were fully illustrated. So much of the skill of those who made woodcuts and etchings was to provide illustrations to stories or show how the news should be viewed. This concentration on conveying realistic images created a backlash among artists. They wanted to produce prints which would be seen as fully acceptable works of art in their own right. Such an artist was Samuel Palmer.

He went through three stages of artistic development. Much influenced by William Blake, he produced coloured images of bucolic delight where farm workers and such were placed in an idyllic setting. He influenced many and his images are still popular. His next stage was to travel widely and produce detailed watercolour pictures, mainly landscapes. These were generally seen as overwrought.



His final stage was to move to etching, where his originality and skill produced masterpieces. His etchings are quite dark and you have to really look into them to see what Palmer is saying, yet there is always light within them. There are not many but there are two which link with the idea of a card for Christmas.

Palmer was a committed Christian and suffered from depressions and therefore conveyed use of light to lead us forward.

One of his etchings directly concerns Christmas. In this picture he shows a shepherd leaving his flock at the end of the day heading towards his cottage with the door open showing light and security.

It is based on the poem which has these lines,

Old Christmas comes, to close the waned year,
And aye the shepherd's heart to make right glad;
Who, when his teeming flocks are homeward had,
To blazing hearth repairs, and nut-brown beer;

Many today would see this as sentimental twaddle but it isn't. Everyone in winter wishes to return to a warm and secure home after a day's work.

The second image is called "The Lonely Tower." It shows an evening scene, again with a flock of sheep with shepherds and across a narrow valley a tower with a single light. It is up to the viewer to interpret this and there are many ways. However at Christmas it seems to provide an interesting aspect.

In this tranquil country image the evening is passing yet this could have been the setting for the shepherds at the time of Christmas.



In the light of the moon and the single distant light there comes another one which will light up the world. The shepherds are told of the Christ child which will be a light for them and everyone including those in the tower.

Changed New Method for Calculating Parish Share What is Parish Share?

Parish Share is the way the Church of England pays for mission.

It is made up of 2 parts: approximately 37% is a fixed amount, which pays for Curates, Bishop's Appointments (not St James' House Admin Staff), Training of Clergy, Mission and Growth Fund, Church Schools and Mission Grants, Clergy Housing; approximately 63% is a flexible amount and depends on the number of full time equivalent (fte) clergy that the Deanery chooses to appoint across the deanery. Currently we have 10.5 fte posts in Sefton North.

How is Parish Share set for each Parish?

Until a few years ago the diocese set the parish share for each parish, this was based on 5 criteria:

- 1. The weekly attendance in each parish
- 2. The socio-economic factor of each parish
- 3. A restriction on how much a parish share would go up or down each year
- 4. An upper limit on what a parish should pay
- 5. A lower limit on what a parish should pay.

Now, however, the responsibility has been passed to the deanery. The deanery tells the diocese each year how many fte clergy posts it will have, and based on that the diocese asks the deanery for a set sum of money. In 2021 this was just over £800,000. The deanery then has the responsibility of allocating the parish share to each parish.

Parish Share Working Group

The deanery is aware that parish share is not only missional giving, but also very sacrificial giving. For every parish, it is their largest item of expenditure. There was, therefore, a strong desire to consult with the parishes on the fairest way to allocate the deanery's share among the parishes.

The deanery consequently set up a working group and asked for a representative from each parish. This group was tasked with creating a formula which could be used to allocate the parish share each year.

The new Parish Share formula that was recommended and unanimously agreed at the Deanery Synod in October included the average weekly attendance, initially this will use the 2019 figures due to great fluctuations due to Covid; the number of Clergy allocated to a Parish, this means those Parishes with part-time clergy or multiple churches will pay a smaller amount, curates are paid by the diocese and are not included in the deanery allocation; and the socio-economic factor of each parish.

As a church with a growing congregation, St Peter's will see an increase in our Parish Share payments over the next couple of years.



Confirmation is the completion of baptism in the Confirmation sense that, for those who were baptised as infants and for whom promises were made on their behalf by parents and godparents, those

same promises are now made personally by the individual.

In confirmation we 'confirm' that we are ready to dedicate ourselves to Jesus and to live the Christian life as best we can; and God 'confirms' that he loves us and accepts us, and bestows on us afresh the Holy Spirit to help and strengthen us all our days. Confirmation is an affirming of faith and a very meaningful step. Confirmation is available to anyone who feels ready to make this decision from Year 6 through to adulthood.

Those who wish to be confirmed, either as a young person or an adult, please contact the Clergy.

For young people in Year 6, preparation for Confirmation will be arranged after school.

For any adult or teenager who would like to be confirmed it is recommended that they attend the Christian Basics Course in January (see page 13).

So whatever age you are, if you are interested in being confirmed or if you have further questions, please do contact us. We do not have a date for the service vet but it will be May or June.

The Sign of the Cross

One of the most obvious Christian signs is the cross. Almost every Church contains at least one cross, some contain many. We have a prominent cross at the altar, and another is carried in procession. As well as the cross in metal or wood, the *sign of the cross* has been a common feature of Christian worship throughout the centuries. Most commonly perhaps the cross is used in this way at the blessing. The priest will often make the sign of the cross over the people, and a traditional response is for them to sign themselves.

In the name of the Father and of the Son

At other moments during the liturgy the sign of the cross is also often made. At Baptism, those who are baptised are signed with a cross - showing that they are Christ's, and share in his resurrection.

In the Eucharist too the sign of the cross is common. The priest may make the sign of the cross at various points during the consecration prayer at the Eucharist, and the congregation may also choose to sign themselves - often at the words of Christ in the Eucharist, 'do this in remembrance of me,' and at the very end of the consecration.

Making the sign of the cross is a non-verbal way of identifying ourselves with the sacrifice and resurrection of Christ. It is a way of showing thanks and also a way of demonstrating acceptance of God's gift of grace to us. While making the sign of the cross has tended to be associated with 'high church' practices within Anglicanism, it is a common practice throughout Christendom. Indeed other actions - especially the lifting up of hands - are also common within Christian worship. Archbishop Cranmer wrote in the First English Prayer Book of 1549:

'As touching, kneeling, crossing, holding up of hands, knocking upon the breast, and other gestures: they may be used or left as every man's devotion serveth without blame.'

So, when we worship together in Church, whether we choose to make the sign of the cross or not, let us always be thankful for the passion, death and resurrection of Christ, and God's extravagant gift of grace to all of us.



St Luke - A New Christmas Tradition

It has been said that of all the Gospel writers we would most like to meet, it would be St Luke who would come first.

He was a Gentile by birth, in fact he is the only writer in the New Testament who is not a Jew. He was a doctor by profession and a Christian by conversion. Luke became the companion of St Paul and worked with him.

But what he is most remembered for is that he is the writer of the 3rd Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. He is often called Luke the Evangelist – Luke the Bearer of Good News and his Gospel is full of encouragement.

Firstly, his Gospel has been described as the **Universal Gospel** as he shows that Jesus is for all people without distinction of race, gender or creed. Luke records Jesus as saying that in the Kingdom of God people will come from north, south, east and west. He also recalls that Jesus said that the greatest faith he had encountered had been that of a pagan centurion. Jesus is for all people, everywhere.

Secondly, Luke's Gospel has been called the **Gospel of the Poor**. Luke has great sympathy for the underdog. In the parable of the rich man and Lazarus, it is the poor man who is received into heaven. It is the contrite Zacchaeus who is forgiven. It is the penitent thief who is assured of eternal life, and it is only St Luke who records the parable of the Prodigal Son. No one gets lost in the crowd with Jesus. No one is too minor for Jesus to notice and to love.

Luke also gives a special place to women at a time when their status was very much inferior. He tells of the woman who anointed Jesus' feet; how Jesus commended Mary, the sister of Martha; and gives an important place in Jesus' ministry to Mary Magdalene.

Then Luke's Gospel is supremely the **Gospel of praise and joy**. The phrase 'praising God' occurs more often in Luke's Gospel than in all the rest of the New Testament put together. Three of the great canticles of praise that we use to worship — The Benedictus, the Magnificat and the Nunc Dimittis - all come from St Luke's Gospel. There is joy at the beginning of his Gospel as the angels announce "**good tidings of great joy**" to the shepherds. There is joy in the middle as Jesus tells of the great joy in heaven over one sinner who repents; there is the joy of finding the lost coin, the lost sheep and the lost son. And there is joy and praise at the end of his Gospel as, after the Ascension, the disciples return to Jerusalem, "**filled with great joy**" spending their time in the Temple "**giving thanks to God.**" **So...**

A NEW CHRISTMAS TRADITION

Beginning 1st December, read one chapter of the Gospel of Luke each evening. There are 24 chapters. On Christmas Eve you will have read an entire account of Jesus' life and wake up Christmas morning knowing why we celebrate.

Celebrating 50 Years of Ministry

There was a wonderful service on Sunday 31st October, celebrating with Canon Alison Woodhouse her 50th anniversary in ministry. Fifty years ago women could not be ordained and the only option was to become a Parish Worker and then a Deaconess.

Alison began her ministry in Christ Church,
Bayston Hill, Lichfield and then in 1981 moved to
Liverpool and became a Deaconess in St Luke's
Church, West Derby. The ever-evolving titles for
women in ministry meant that between 1986 to
1995 Alison was a Deaconess, Parish Deacon and
then Curate at St John's Church, Burscough.
Then before Alison retired in 2007 she was Vicar
of St Luke's Church, an Area Dean and served as





a Chaplain to The Queen.

On your behalf we gave Alison a voucher for a local restaurant near to her new home in Lytham St Annes along with flowers and a cake. We pray for Alison God's blessing in this new chapter of her life.

For many women their journey in ministry was a complicated one. The Church of England agreed to ordain women to the diaconate in 1987, to the priesthood in 1992 and as bishops in 2014.

Many have benefitted from Alison's ministry and it was a great day to give thanks not least for her time with us in St Peter's during her retirement.



The Parochial Church Council (PCC) The PCC is the executive committee of a parish. A brief report on the November meeting of St Peter's PCC

Safeguarding: Update about the new Church of England rules – DBS clearance will be every three years (was every five years). In addition to the Basic Awareness Course, all PCC members now need to complete a Foundation Course.

School Governer: Allan Jones has been re-appointed as a Governor at Trinity St Peter's School.

275th **Anniversary Celebrations**: A Programme of Celebrations was shared and the need for good publicity emphasised.

Restrictions for rest of year including Christmas: The PCC decided to continue the precautions in place and to encourage people to test regularly. No plans at the moment to bring the chalice back.

Vicar's Items: The Vicar encouraged the PCC to be aware of new members of the congregation and to help them become part of our community. Also when new neighbours moved in to deliver a parish magazine with a welcome card which can be collected from the Parish Office.

Uganda Committee: Following the last PCC meeting, the agreed prospective payments for Vivian's penultimate hospital visit in November; the additional furniture for the teachers; and Richard's bonus were paid. When lockdown ends, the Term 2 payment to school of £673 will be made to the school.

Diversity: A Diversity Statement was agreed by the deanery and each PCC has been asked to look at it in the light of its own parish. Putting forward the concept of Diversity. There will be a discussion at the next PCC meeting.

Finance: Parish Share Working Group formula proposal on how the parish share should be allocated to the churches in the Sefton North Deanery has been approved and will be applied from January 2022.

Fabric: There was a new banner for Remembrance Sunday. A new Incumbents Board has been mounted in the Formby Chapel. A socket has been installed at the back of the Church for the contactless payment machine.

Faith and Outreach: The annual collection of chocolates and sweets for the Soup Kitchen is getting a great response. The support for the Food Bank has been maintained. Afternoon Tea Boxes will be delivered again in January. The monthly Eucharist in two care homes has re-started.

Horizons: The blue envelope Advent Collection will go to The Whitechapel Project.



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On All Saints' Day at the 10.00am Service the preacher was MU Member and former Church Study Group Leader Alison Woodhouse who was celebrating fifty years of ministry in the Church of England. We were delighted to wish her well on her retirement to Lytham St Annes and thanked her for the inspiring service she has given to St Peter's.

Her theme was Perseverance. She recounted how, in spite of her parents' misgivings, she had given up a career in teaching to study for ministry in the Church of England.

Perseverance had taken her from Parish Worker and Deaconess, through ordination and into appointments as Curate in West Derby, Vicar of St Luke's, Formby, Area Dean, and Chaplain to Her Majesty The Queen.

Our meeting on 4th November was opened by Meryl Petrie and Herbert, who together led us in a short service. Ken Ward then talked about his visit to the WW1 Battlefields, illustrated with pictures of the British and German Battlefields and the totally rebuilt City of Ypres. An acutely moving demonstration of the horror of War.

Our next meeting is the Christmas Party on Thursday, 2nd December, at 1.00 pm in the Parish Hall. Committee Members are asked to arrive at 12.00 noon to prepare. 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



MAKING SENSE

"I suggest that the Christian faith is the practice of making sense of (our) lives that makes sense of the world," wrote Rowan Williams, a former Archbishop of Canterbury.

In the rush and bustle of life with so many competing demands, it's often difficult to find time to sit back, or stand back, and try to make sense of our existence as humans.

We trundle along in an unquestioning rut and sometimes it is only when something tragic happens that shatters our lives that we begin to question what life is all about.

Can faith help us to make sense of our lives and of the world?

Let's start with God and creation.

The first thing to say is that the opening chapters of Genesis are not an early scientific attempt to describe creation. So much of Christianity has been debunked because of a wrong understanding of Genesis. It is all parable up to the time of Abraham. Science tries to answer WHAT, while faith tries to answer WHY.

What Genesis tells us is that God is relational, setting in motion the process of creation so that he could share his love and care with us humans, planting within our make-up a 'spark of the divine' by which we can relate to God and he to us. We are both physical and spiritual beings.

To us, he also gave free-will and choice. Love is never enforced, only offered

And while there have been periods of obedience and faithfulness to God, in the history of the human race there have been more times of rebellion and rejection.

Throughout the centuries, appeals to turn to God were made by prophets and preachers, without success. So God made the ultimate appeal. He came to earth in human form in Jesus to show us his love and assure us of salvation.

In a memorable phrase, "Jesus is the body language of God."

Not only does Jesus call us to know God in a relational way, he also calls us to be his agents in the world. Or, as St Paul put it, we are to be the Body of Christ, his hands, his feet, his voice. God can usually only effect change through us. He is not a heavenly puppeteer pulling strings to make things happen.

Not only has he given us humans choice, he has also imbued the whole of creation with a certain degree of freedom which is necessary for evolution and development. As one scientist put it, "The process that enables some cells to mutate and produce new life will allow other cells to mutate and become malignant." (John Polkinghorne). As a geneticist once told me, "This makes life a bit of a lottery."

God is not aloof from all of this. As shown by the birth of Jesus in a stable, he is present in the midst of life at its dirtiest, and by his cross he shows that he understands and identifies with our suffering.

The cross confirms the infinite love of God for us and that he is willing to forgive us and restore us to himself. Though he cannot change the past, he can forgive the past and help us start afresh.

But Good Friday's cross was not the end. It was followed by the resurrection on Easter morning when Jesus rose from the dead. St Paul assures us that as Christ was raised from the dead, so shall we be.

Death is not the end, rather it is the beginning of a new type of existence, in the life of the world to come, where, we are told, we will be given spiritual bodies. That means that there will be personal continuity, that there will be recognition and communication with all who have gone before.

An American doctor, Eben Alexander, experienced a near-death experience after being struck down by a rare form of bacterial meningitis, and he describes the after-life like this, "My experience showed me that the death of my body and the brain are not the end of consciousness. Human experience continues beyond the grave...under the gaze of a God who loves and cares about each one of us, and about where the universe itself and all beings within it, are ultimately going." (Proof of Heaven)

Life continues on, and in the life of the world to come wrongs are righted, hurts are healed, evil is overcome and we are given the opportunity to become our true selves and be in relation with God.

Faith enriches life, gives it meaning and purpose, enabling us to overcome rather than be overcome, to hope rather than merely cope.

As Rowan Williams suggested, "The Christian faith is the practice of making sense of (our) lives that makes sense of the world."
