#### ST PETER'S 275 CELEBRATIONS


This year 2022 marks the 275<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the consecration of St Peter's Church.

The origins of St. Peter's can be traced back to the 12<sup>th</sup> century when a chapel existed near the sea. The chapel was destroyed in a storm in 1739, and the decision was taken to build a replacement church further inland – the site of the present church, opposite Church Cottage which was then an inn.

Throughout 2021 a committee has been meeting to plan a year of celebration for this milestone in our history.

#### **Area Dean Re-appointment**

Our Vicar, Anne, has been re-appointed by Bishop Paul Bayes for a further three years as Area Dean. The commissioning took place in Bishop's Lodge on 20<sup>th</sup> January. The Area Dean is commissioned for five years and can be renewed for a maximum of a further three years. Anne has already served for six years and will serve until January 2025. Anne served in the role as an interim Area Dean when the deanery boundaries were being re-drawn before officially taking on the role.



#### What is an Area Dean?

As senior church leaders, Area Deans are charged by their Bishops to exercise an oversight ministry in the deanery. This involves the pastoral and professional support of both clergy and lay leaders in the deanery.

Some of the responsibilities of the Area Dean are:

- Leading a Deanery Mission & Pastoral Committee and facilitating the development of mission in the deanery.
- Establishing connections between the churches.
- Convening the monthly deanery clergy chapter.
- Attending the quarterly Diocesan Advisory Team meeting.
- The Area Dean also participates in the recruitment process for clergy and other staff to the deanery, acts as joint chair with the Lay Chair of the Deanery Synod, and as Returning Officer for lay elections. The Area Dean acts as the Archdeacon's representative with regard to parochial concerns and is present to help parishes who are in an interregnum (vacancy). The Area Dean is also a member of the Cathedral College of Canons.

#### What is a Deanery?

A deanery is a dedicated area which includes a number of churches. We are part of Sefton North Deanery and have 14 churches: St Peter's, Holy Trinity, St Luke's in Formby. St Michael's, Altcar. St Stephen's, Hightown. St Michael's & St Nicholas', Blundellsands. St Luke's, Crosby. All Saints with St Frideswyde, Thornton. St Giles, Aintree. St Andrew's, St Thomas', St Peter's & St James', Maghull & Melling.

The Lay Chair is Elizabeth Chestnutt, a parishioner of St Michaels, Altcar. We have seventeen clergy, including two full-time stipendiary curates and three NSM curates (self-supporting with other jobs). Two of the parishes are vacant and are about to be advertised - Vicar of All Saints & St Frideswyde and Team Rector of Maghull & Melling.

#### **COMPULSION**

During the early part of Queen Elizabeth 1's reign a small group of Londoners gathered on a field to hold a service. The service was led by their elected leader and they were part of a separatist movement often called 'Brownists' after a founder, but a term they disliked. This seemingly innocent joining of Christians to worship was known to the authorities and the local bishop had the power to stop and insist on their imprisonment. This was done and some of those thought to be leaders remained in prison for many months. Today this sort of activity would probably go unnoticed but to the Elizabethans it undermined the new church settlement.

The church authorities during the Tudor period wanted a church which would encompass the whole nation, bring about unity of worship and provide a theology in the prayer book. Those who gathered in the London field strongly opposed all this. They wanted an end to bishops, no prayer book, and had no wish to have their worship ruled by priests. In a time of uncertainty, as the state was looking for stability, the separatist groups were seen as a direct threat and in line with other challenges to the state were dealt with as criminals. Eventually many members of the separatist movement, mainly from London and Norfolk, settled in Leiden, Holland.

Their decision to move from Holland to America using the 'Mayflower' was made after several years in Leiden because they wanted to retain their English identity and many of their children were being absorbed into the Dutch community. When they sailed from Plymouth they were however joined by some others from England who were tired of threats of persecution.



This drive to enforce the Anglican Settlement and the constant pressure against separatist Puritan groups went on for over another century and began to be relaxed only through the 19<sup>th</sup> Century. Yet even in the mid 1800's the local magistrates held power over some religious activities.

These examples of the law are taken from a magistrates guide book published in 1842:

- Depraving the Christian religion, first offence barred from holding civil or military appointments.
- Refusing to pay church rates, fined.
- All persons, not having a just or reasonable excuse, neglecting to go to church (or other place of worship allowed under the toleration act), fined.

It is possible to assess this level of coercion by looking at a survey of church attendance carried out in 1851. The figures are not easy to read but in one district of London out of a population of 2,202,236 those who attended church of England services on one Sunday were 468,911, and a total of 814,155 attended all places of worship on that day.

There is an interesting example of coercion in the design and use of the prison chapel in Lincoln castle.



The chapel was built in the 1850's. Chapel was compulsory and the chapel was like a theatre of tiered seats but when a prisoner entered his seat he shut the door each side of him and could not see those next to him or above and below. This was part of the 'separate' system which isolated prisoners during their whole sentence as punishment. It had to end due to damage to their mental health.

Is this study of compulsion relevant today? Yes, it probably is. A recent book on the Tudor separatists\* argues that the demands made by them were an important part of the drive for free speech and resisting state coercion. The freedom we have now to worship freely and practice religion is precious and, thank goodness, enshrined in Human Rights. There is always the need to balance the need of each individual's religious understanding and an acceptable church theology but remembering the long history of religious development in this country allows us to realize the need to protect the important freedom we now have.




#### **Little Fishes Pre-School Group**

#### Love that Bar!

Don't we all just love bars? Graduating from Mars Bars to Coffee bars, pub bars to wine bars, cocktail bars, gin bars and lounge bars, bars seem to be a part of life whatever stage of the cycle we're in.



These days a new type of bar is the 'in thing' and as far as the planet is concerned it can't be recommended highly enough. Some might say that we've seen this (or similar) before, that we're just reinventing the wheel. Well perhaps we are. And perhaps that is exactly what needs to happen. Not everything our grandparents did in the time before mass commercialisation now seems so terribly old fashioned, just quite sensible.

Have you guessed what type of bar this newcomer might be yet? Closely related to the soap bar, which reduces the use of single use plastic bottles of liquid soap, this newcomer is the descriptively named shampoo bar. This bar might take a bit of getting used to, but once rubbed onto the hair and lathered up with water it does a fine job. # From the Back Pew Ted Woods

#### **DESMOND TUTU**

On the first day of this new year the funeral took place of one of the greatest leaders in the modern world, Desmond Tutu, former Archbishop of Cape Town, South Africa, and often called "the Bishop of Peace." He was 90, a good age for one who had been a sickly child from birth and had contracted polio, and who as a teenager had been in hospital for 18 months with tuberculosis.

It was while he was in school in Johannesburg that he got to know Fr Trevor Huddleston, an English Anglican priest who ministered in Sophiatown. The young Desmond had become a server in Huddleston's church and he was greatly influenced by the guidance and support Huddleston gave him. According to one biographer Huddleston was "the greatest single influence in Tutu's life."



Although he originally wanted to become a doctor, Tutu trained to be a teacher. But when in 1953 the Bantu Education Act was passed to enforce racially separated education Tutu resigned from education and offered himself for ordination in the Anglican Church. He was duly ordained in 1960.

After serving a curacy in a rather posh part of Johannesburg he was sent off for further study to King's College, London and returned to South Africa in 1966 to be a lecturer in the Federal Theological Seminary.

In 1974 he was nominated as bishop of Johannesburg but narrowly failed to get the required number of votes, but was appointed as the first black dean of Johannesburg Cathedral where he became an outspoken voice for equality and the rights of black people, eschewing violence and revenge. For his unwavering pursuit of justice, peace and reconciliation he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1984. A year later he did become Bishop of Johannesburg and two years later was appointed Archbishop of Cape Town.

The status of these posts gave him a platform to speak and be heard about the issues of equality, fairness and forgiveness.

Fr Huddleston had imbued in the young Desmond a dynamic Christian faith and a disciplined spirituality and it was this that informed and inspired Tutu's words and actions.

While Nelson Mandela was in prison Tutu, as Archbishop of Cape Town, was the only person of stature to speak on behalf of the oppressed black majority, and it is said that without Tutu and Mandela post-apartheid South Africa would have been a blood bath. Instead it became known as The Rainbow Nation.

Tutu preached sacrificial love and forgiveness. After a teaching term in Atlanta, Georgia, his students presented him with a farewell plaque on which was inscribed, "Nobel Prize Winner – even if was for preaching one sermon!"

Tutu laughed and admitted that he indeed had only one sermon which, he said, went like this, "I am a person of infinite worth. Why? Because I am loved by God with a love that will not let me go. I can only love others because God tells me that I am lovable." It was God's love for him that enabled Tutu to love and forgive others.

In 1995 he was appointed chair of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission which was an attempt to heal the wounds of the past in South Africa. The TRC had three aims:- the first was confession: with those responsible for human rights abuses fully disclosing their actions, the second aim was forgiveness in the form of a legal amnesty from prosecution, and third, restitution: with perpetrators making amends to their victims.

It was a post to which Tutu brought his Christian beliefs and principles, but it took a tremendous toll on him and what he heard often reduced him to tears.

During his ministry Desmond Tutu had become the voice of the voiceless, a role he continued after his retirement in 1994, speaking up bravely and courageously, in the face of a lot of church opposition, in favour of gay rights, and more recently, the legalisation of assisted dying.

His obituary in the Church Times summed up his life in these words:-

"He will be remembered ... as one who was always able to weep with those who wept and to rejoice with those who rejoiced. He will be remembered as a man of prayer, which, from the age of 16, held the first place in his life. He will be remembered for his courage in adversity and for his generosity in victory. He will be remembered for his warm-hearted acceptance to those who were otherwise in danger of rejection by others within the church itself.

But, above all, he will be remembered for his sense of fun, for the irrepressible gaiety that kept bubbling up from the inexhaustible well-spring of the Spirit within. Never had the Lord Christ a less solemn witness to the gospel of the resurrection."

Desmond Tutu was not without his faults and failings. No human being, however saintly, ever is. He was not liked by everyone. No prophet ever is. He had his critics and detractors as anybody who preaches the gospel of love and forgiveness always has.

But he was a shining light in times of darkness, a voice of calm in times of turbulence, an example of Christian leadership when many sought only revenge and the embodiment of love in a hate-filled land. In short, as far as is humanly possible, an icon of Jesus.

Though physically small, he was a spiritual giant, and we give thanks for his life and witness.
