

In May we look forward to joining together for worship to celebrate the Ascension of our Lord on Thursday 26th May at 7.30pm in Holy Trinity Church. 












CURACY

A.P.C.M – Monday 16th May 7.30pm in Church

After Easter signals the time for each parish to hold its Annual Parochial Church Meeting, which is basically our A.G.M. This is an opportunity to hear how things are going overall in the parish, the plans for the future, to receive the financial report and to elect members onto the P.C.C. for a three year term and the Churchwardens for the coming year.



The A.P.C.M. is important because it's an exercise in democracy in the church. The parish is not 'them': rather it's about 'us'. Everyone has a say in the life of the parish.

So do consider coming along.

What is a museum?

There has recently been a spate of TV programmes about museums. These programmes seem to fall into three categories: those that concentrate on preserving fine objects; those which provide information about how a community lived during a certain period of time; and those that illustrate how an industry worked and its affect on an area. Many of these museums set themselves high standards in their exhibitions and also aim to be seen as significant in the life of today.

It is not necessarily what the museum contains but why it is there that seems important. Are we expected to learn from them, be entertained, grateful not to have lived in their time or take on board a lesson for the future? This latter point has recently taken on an important resonance. Many presentations are designed to show that we must not repeat history.

There is the well-known saying, "those who do not learn from history are doomed to repeat it." Another apposite saying recently dug up is "History is not there for you to like or dislike. It is there for you to learn from it. And if it offends you, even better because then you are less likely to repeat it. It's not yours to erase. It belongs to all of us."

Some museums are good at concentrating on a single subject but often do not place it in the context of the totality of the rest of time. A particular industry heritage centre will show the poor conditions of the workforce but not place it against similar conditions in many other areas for example they show correctly the injury and death rate of a particular nineteenth century work but fail to relate the figures to the even higher rates in the fishing and sailing communities. These details matter because it is important to see the whole picture.

Naturally we are currently worried about inequality and the protection of minorities, a point often brought home by museums. Should we be made to feel continually guilty about our ancestors or is it more important to learn and act?

Two anomalies regarding recording history in museums: One museum which shows a high level of inequality but receives little adverse comment is the old wooden man of war 'HMS Victory' in Portsmouth harbour. The amount of space given to several hundred sailors on one deck amounts to about 2 feet by 5 feet per man. Yet the captain's and the admiral's suites above are very large. Perhaps the lack of comment may be due to the pride which the history of this old ship represents. The other interesting point is that there does not seem to be a museum to the enclosures of the 1700's. This movement brought about an enormous change in the use of the countryside, displacing many and destroying a way of life for those affected.

What has a discussion about museums to do with a parish magazine? Many historic buildings are seen as heritage sites and this is certainly true of cathedrals and churches. Visitors want to see the setting of a medieval lifestyle and the skills of the builders. Heritage is important but a place of worship is not a museum. Religious buildings encompass the whole of a period of history and are built to display and be seen, even to

put individuals in awe. However they are not there to be just concert halls, art galleries, or coffee shops.

Their purpose is to be a place of worship but all this creates a difficult dilemma. Their considerable cost of upkeep and their need for grants means that they have to become venues for antique fairs and other side shows. Cathedrals do a lot to show they are part of living faith and provide a place for sanctuary, for worship and spiritual care. In fact these are their main purposes and as such there is the question of should they compromise to allow secular activity to take over their premises. Without this compromise they would not survive as church or museum.

The Dean of St Paul's Cathedral has been reported as saying that his cathedral will have to close due a significant drop in visitors. Quite what he meant by closure was not clear, hopefully not as a place of worship. If this country wants to have cathedrals then they will have to pay up.

A church is not an expression of the past but represents a living community and a way of life which changes and adapts. One which correctly judges the past, condemns mistakes and horrifying actions and openly recognises and expresses remorse for errors. The moral teaching of Christ demands this.

Families will then have enough food to make a living.





 You can now drop them off in our collection box in the Church Porch.


The packs will be converted into reusable raw materials to prevent empty packs spending a lifetime in landfill.

A Walk to Holy Island (Lindisfarne)



At long last, after the pandemic, things seemed to be getting back to normal and Steve Edwards and myself were desperate to get out and about on another walk. After a short discussion, and having spent a great week up in Northumberland in October 2021 with our much better halves, we decided to opt for St Cuthbert's Way – a 62 mile or 65 mile walk (depending on which book you read) from Melrose in Scotland to Holy Island (Lindisfarne) in Northumberland.

The walk is named after a 7th century saint who started his religious life in Melrose Abbey, close to where Cuthbert was born, and where the walk naturally starts from. It travels though some beautiful countryside to finish at the Priory on Holy Island where St Cuthbert was Prior and then Bishop and where he was buried after passing on 20th March 687. His remains were later moved numerous times to escape invading armies and now lie in Durham Cathedral.

Having decided to take on the walk and as our days of carrying all and sundry with us are long over, I contacted Macs Adventure and informed them of our plans – St Cuthbert's Way; 4 days walking; as early as possible. Within a couple of days we had the itinerary; B&B's booked; luggage transfer arranged; and a start date of the 1st April. An appropriate date, I can hear you say, for a couple of old fools, but this is the earliest date in the season they take bookings from.

So the schedule was fixed – 15 miles day 1; 18 miles day 2; 13.5 miles day 3; and 18 miles day 4; and so Steve was on the case to book public transport to Melrose. It was at this time we decided to add another day or two on and go up to Edinburgh for the day on Thursday 31st March, and then take a day to travel by bus over to Melrose on Friday 1st April before kicking off the walk on the Saturday.



This also gave us the opportunity to walk up Arthur's Seat – an ancient volcano described by Robert Louis Stevenson as "a hill for magnitude, a mountain in virtue of its bold design" and providing fantastic views all across Edinburgh and well worth the slog to get to the top.

After arriving in Melrose we settled for the night after suitably "carbing up" in the evening and set off walking on the Saturday.

The walk itself was great with fantastic scenery, all the better for being blessed with dry weather while we were walking. Snow on the hills; valleys and mountains; wildlife as well as a fair share of domestic animals; amazing views as well as some sorrowful sights with many areas of forest devastated by recent storms.

The walk finished with the option of walking across the causeway to Holy Island or walking across the bay on the Pilgrims Path – both of which can obviously only be undertaken tide permitting.

Having started out an hour earlier than previous days we were determined to make it in time to walk across the Pilgrim's Path, and with a following wind, literally, we arrived in good time at just after 1pm with the timetables stating we had to be across the 3-mile path by 4.20pm.






Boots and socks off; we set off across the mud flats and I can quite honestly say that after about 15 minutes this walk of faith became a walk of absolute grim determination as we have both never been so cold! Our feet were blocks of ice and even my hands turned blue!

Thanks be to God for Holy Island hospitality and Scottish Whisky as once we reached the end of the freezing 3 mile walk across the bay, we cleaned ourselves off and headed for the nearest hostelry to thaw out on a couple of whiskies and a plate of chips - the high life indeed.

So our walk was over, and how great it was to once again be experiencing the great outdoors and the UK's beautiful scenery with a great friend. Roll on the next one – if our bodies hold up that is !!!

Ascension

St Peter's Church was originally "The Ancient Chapelry of Formby, St Peter Apostle and Martyr." It dates from the 12th century and was situated very close to the sea. St Peter's was part of the Parish of Walton, which is why the Rector of Walton is still our Patron. This chapel became "ruinous" and a new church, on the present site, was built in 1746 and consecrated on 19th July 1747.

NUMBERS

There is an apocryphal story (which is probably true!) of an ambitious vicar of a city church, once fashionable and well-attended, but which had since seen decline.

After a sparsely attended evensong, he was filling in the services register and asked the verger, "Tommy, how many were in church tonight?" "Fifteen, including yourself," Tommy replied. "Nonsense, there were more than that!" the vicar replied. "There must have been at least twenty-five. I'll put down thirty!"



Years ago, I got talking to a newly consecrated bishop whose former parish was near my own. "I believe my successor is packing them in," he remarked. "I hear the number of people of people is much higher than in my time there." And then he added, "But I also hear that he counts their legs rather than their heads!"

Numbers are an obsession – and a tyranny – for clergy. Perhaps because they are, for themselves, the only yardstick by which they are able to assess the success, or failure, of their ministry.

Nothing gives a vicar more of a boost than a full church. Nothing depresses a vicar more than sparsely attended services.

And in the business model of church that the powers-that-be have imposed on parishes, numbers play an even greater part.

Here in this diocese, the Bishop's Rule of Life calls "disciples" – that's you and me, by the way - to bring one person into the regular worshipping life of the church; leaders – those are mainly the vicars - are called to grow 100 new congregations, 1,000 new leaders and 10,000 new disciples.

No pressure then!

And clergy have to contend with all the myths of former years: those days of old when, people say, 'the church was always full.' Yet research has shown that the rates of church attendance in some parts of England were, pro-rata, poorer when compared to the twentieth century!

Martyn Percy, former Dean of Christ Church, Oxford, has said that Jesus had

little to say about numerical growth and popularity. He says, "Jesus was not a grower of synagogues, or a synagogue planter but was about his Father's business, establishing the kingdom of God." And added, that the kingdom of God was not about recruits but about justice, compassion and showing the unconditional love of God.

St John in his Gospel records that, after a particularly complex teaching session, many of his disciples said, "This teaching is too difficult...Because of this many of his disciples turned back and no longer went about with him." (John 6: 60,66).

At the end of his ministry, Jesus was left alone except for a few women who stood around his cross. All the disciples had forsaken him and fled.

But as we know, from this side of Easter, that was not failure but a prelude to a flowering of faith that has lasted 2,000 years.

And clergy nod their theological heads and agree, and then go back to worrying about the numbers of those attending their services.

When the diocese sends out deanery statistics, the most popular section for concerned clergy is the attendance figures. When taking services in other churches and waiting for services to begin, most clergy look at the numbers in the services register and start making comparisons with their own situation. They will probably deny it, but it happens!

Yet, while numbers are not everything, they are important. They are an indicator of future viability. The parish needs not only "buttresses" who support the church from outside but "pillars" supporting it from the inside.

I once had a three-church benefice. There was the main church in the town and two rural churches which alternated services on Sundays. The congregation of one of those rural churches always came to the later town church service rather than to the other rural church which was at a more suitable time for them. Asked why, they replied that if ever one of the rural churches had to be closed, they didn't want the other rural church to have inflated attendance numbers because they had been there! They reckoned that the town church would always survive, but they wouldn't chance their church being closed because of low average attendances!

Again, it has to be said, a well-attended church attracts new members. Mission and evangelism are the buzz words of today's church. But, in fact, one of the best ways to 'evangelise' is to go to church. It shows the importance of faith to others far more convincingly than words or special ecclesiastical stunts.

Such is the affliction and the tyranny of the numbers game for clergy: we know it's not the be-all and the end-all of ministry, but all the same.....!!!

By the way, that vicar with his "evangelistic" numbers was eventually made a bishop!


