

### Dear Friends,

There was a good turnout for the **Annual Parochial Church Meeting** as we took a little time to look at where we are as a parish and where we hope to go.

Of course, this year is our 275<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the consecration of our church.

We started with the Organ Demonstration Concert and then the Heritage Week, and we thank David Holroyd and Nick Philpott for heading up those events. Both events resulted in people coming into our church who have never visited before. The resounding comment has been how welcoming everyone is. This is so very important because the celebrations this year are not simply us patting ourselves on the back for our past successes but showcasing that we are a vibrant, welcoming, caring, worshipping community.

This year needs to be a major foundation stone as we journey together into the future. A living community is one that constantly develops and adapts, and that is what I believe we are and what we can become better at being. We have so many ways of connecting with people and we need to use them to stay fresh and to be open to where the Spirit wants to lead us. That will take trust and, at times, courage as to grow and develop may mean leaving our comfort zones, but ultimately we will flourish in God's love as a parish, as a community and beyond.



The next 275 event is the **Flower Festival & Art Exhibition** from Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> June to Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> June. This is an opportunity for us all to bring along our friends and neighbours – this is a year of invitation and an opportunity to be visible in our community.

Could I remind you of two events that need to be pre-booked? There will be a Celebrity Preview Opening to the Flower & Art Festival on Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> June. Spaces are limited.



The other event is the **275**<sup>th</sup> **Anniversary Dinner** in the Marquee in Formby Cricket Club on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> July. A hot and cold buffet will be served and there will be entertainment and magic! Tickets must also be pre-booked, so don't miss out on what will be a great evening. All the details are on page 11.

A major area that has developed over the past 5 years is our commitment to be a parish that gives training opportunities for those feeling called to ministry. I am so encouraged about how great you are as a parish when it comes to having people amongst us. It is not every parish that understands what this means – to help people experience ministry, to be encouragers, to warmly welcome someone even for a short time into our parish family. In the past year we have had Matt Parkes with us as part of his Reader training and Lilly Nelson as part of the discernment process for ordination. This year we welcome for his final year of curacy Revd Gordon MacLeod who had been on placement with us when he was training. The importance of the influence that this has on people's lives cannot be underestimated and I am glad that a commitment has been made to continue to be a **training parish** because we also benefit from those who join us.

The pandemic did encourage us to move quickly on plans for **live streaming** and this is something we plan to keep each Sunday, and I know that it is appreciated by many. The main morning service can have anything between 50 and 120 views and many of these will be couples watching together, so reaching more people. This has been a connection with those who are unable to attend on a Sunday because of illness or mobility issues, those who are still feeling vulnerable around Covid, those with young families who might not be able to be with us every week. It has been a connection with care homes and with those who have moved away. It has also proved invaluable for new people because they can see what we are like before having the courage to join us!

One new family that I was talking to at the Children's Haribo Service have been watching us since Christmas because they knew they were moving to Formby and wanted to find a church to join, and this story is not unique.





Another result of the pandemic is that we have not been sharing the **chalice** and I feel it may be time to bring the chalice back. This would be optional so if anyone prefers to receive only the wafer that is absolutely fine – it is personal choice. My thinking is it that when you come up to receive there will be a chalice at each side and you can either stop to receive the wine or continue to your seat. Those who attended the APCM agreed with this plan.

Another growth area has been the number receiving House Communion, as I have presently 15 on the list – I thank Tricia Shaw and Peter Davies for their help in this important ministry.

Paul McHenry ends his four years as a churchwarden: to say those years have been eventful would be an understatement. With everything that has happened in that time Paul's commitment to the role of churchwarden and his dedication to St Peter's never lessened. I want to thank Paul most sincerely for his kindness, wisdom and his sense of humour.



As I mentioned at the APCM, this last year has been eventful in so many ways. ### **Majesty**



Richard II was ten years old when he became king and there is a fine picture of him sitting on his throne holding the orb and sceptre. In many ways this image sums up how we perceive the idea of medieval monarchy in practice. Yet Richard was not a success. He antagonized his barons and in later life during solemn festivals would sit on his throne in the royal hall for hours without speaking and anyone on whom his eyes fell had to bow their knee to him. This illustrates the authority of the medieval king and his relationship with his subjects. Both church and state acknowledged that they had to work together and balance the demands of the authority of a monarch, the aristocracy and church.

The history of the monarchy in this country shows how these factors gained authority and struggled to have the controlling power. The last factor often considered was the needs of the people. Richard was faced with the Peasant's Revolt. The rise of Parliament has redefined the relationship between this country's sovereign and the state.

Now it is the Queen's duty to represent the United Kingdom and provide that essential continuity which is part of our identity. She still carries the orb and sceptre and her throne shows us her in her authority. We all give thanks to her for the way she has dedicated her life to providing a model of monarchy for our time.

At the very centre of the cathedral at Aachen there is a throne which dominates the area and faces the high altar. This was built by Emperor Charlemagne and represents the status he wanted to have. He was buried there in 814 AD. The fact that it faces the altar ensures that he acknowledged the need to define his relationship with God.



This leads to the relationship of God to us. The idea of kingship has been in the Bible from earliest times.

In Luke's Gospel the angel Gabriel proclaims to Mary, "Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and shall name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule over the house of Jacob, and of his kingdom there will be no end." The Magi ask, "Where is He who has been

born King of the Jews?." The epistle to the Hebrews says about Jesus, "After making purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high."

The important difference between a mortal king and Christ is that Christ now reigns for ever, but more importantly he is willing to come to us and seek us out.





### JUBILEE SUNDAY AND PENTECOST


On Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> June we celebrate Pentecost and HRH Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee.

### **National Anthem**

Like many aspects of British constitutional life, "God Save the Queen" derives its official status from custom and use, not from Royal Proclamation nor from Act of Parliament. The variation in the UK of the lyrics to "God Save the Queen" is the oldest amongst those currently used, and forms the basis on which all other versions used throughout the Commonwealth are formed; though, again, the words have varied over time.

The author of the tune is unknown, and it may originate in plainchant, but an attribution to the composer John Bull is sometimes made.

"God Save the Queen" is the de facto national anthem of the United Kingdom, and one of two national anthems used by New Zealand since 1977, as well as for several of the UK's territories that have their own additional local anthem. It is also the royal anthem – played specifically in the presence of the monarch – of the aforementioned countries, as well.

Beyond its first verse, which is consistent, "God Save the Queen/King" has many historic and extant versions. Since its first publication, different verses have been added and taken away and, even today, different publications include various selections of verses in various orders. In general, only one verse is sung. Sometimes two verses are sung, and, on rare occasions, three.

The sovereign and her or his spouse are saluted with the entire composition, while other members of the royal family who are entitled to royal salute (such as the Prince of Wales and the Duke of Cambridge along with their spouses)

receive just the first six bars.

The first six bars also form all or part of the Vice Regal Salute in some Commonwealth realms other than the UK (e.g., in Canada, governors general and lieutenant governors at official events are saluted.

### PENTECOST AROUND THE WORLD

The Feast of Pentecost falls on 5<sup>th</sup> June this year, coming as it does 50 days after Easter. Pentecost commemorates the coming of the Holy Spirit on the first disciples.

In a recent book, Mark Oakley, Dean of St John's College, Cambridge, mentions the different customs of celebrating Pentecost to be found in various countries down the ages.

In medieval Bavaria, a wooden bird, representing a dove, would be lowered from the ceiling of the church to symbolise the descent of the Holy Spirit on the first disciples. However, to counteract any idea that the Holy Spirit is wooden and lifeless, choirboys would tip buckets of water on the congregation at the same time to "baptise them with the Holy Spirit"!



In some parts of Europe, the courts were closed and servants' work suspended. The message was clear – the Holy Spirit sets you free. You are no longer a slave but a child of God.

In France, it was customary to blow trumpets during the service to celebrate Pentecost. This was to symbolise the rushing mighty wind and to blow away the cobwebs of dull conformity and tradition.

In Oriental churches, the congregation would kneel and read poetry. Kneeling is a sign of submitting to God and poetry reading was an acknowledgement that the Holy Spirit inspires art, craft, music and literature and not just "churchy" things.

In Italy, it was the custom to scatter rose petals from the ceiling of the church to symbolise the tongues of fire that rested on the heads of the disciples on the first Pentecost.

And here, in England, Pentecost was, and is, known as Whitsunday because of the white clothes worn by those who came to be baptised on that day. Whitsun ales were brewed in honour of the day. On the first day of Pentecost the onlookers thought that the disciples were drunk, even though it was only 9 o'clock in the morning!

This year the Feast of Pentecost coincides with the Queen's platinum celebrations. It is a happy coincidence as the Queen has made no secret of her Christian faith or of her dependence on the guidance of the Holy Spirit during her long and grace-filled reign.

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


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

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
### Church Flowers

St Peter's Church was originally "The Ancient Chapelry of Formby, St Peter Apostle and Martyr." It dates from the 12<sup>th</sup> century and was situated very close to the sea. St Peter's was part of the Parish of Walton, which is why the Rector of Walton is still our Patron. This chapel became "ruinous" and a new church, on the present site, was built in 1746 and consecrated on 19<sup>th</sup> July 1747.



## From the Back Pew Ted Woods

### SAY IT WITH FLOWERS!

One of the major events of our 275 celebrations is this month's *Footsteps Through Formby* Flower Festival from Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> to Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> June, as, in a special way, the flower arrangements will illuminate our knowledge of the area.

Flowers don't just tell a story or give a message when they are put together. Our Victorian predecessors believed that individual flowers and individual colours conveyed special meanings.

Like, sending a red rose to say, "I love you", or a white rose to tell someone that they were worthy of them. To get orange blossoms meant that the sender thought you were pure and lovely! Lily of the valley signified a return to happiness.

A pink carnation stood for a woman's love but a yellow one meant, "I don't love you", whereas a red carnation stood for a broken heart.



Similarly, chrysanthemums conveyed special messages. Red stood for love, white for truth and yellow meant, "I've been let down"!

So be careful about what you buy in flowers!

I've been thinking what flowers might represent the kind of people we are.

For example, are we Busy Lizzies and Geraniums. They both give plenty of blooms and, once watered, keep going for a long time. How lucky we are in St Peter's to have many Busy Lizzies and Geraniums – people who willingly "get stuck in" when things have to be done and make a blooming good show of it, too! The great thing about these plants is that they are easily slipped. Enthusiasm is contagious.





In contrast is the cactus. We had one that sat on the window shelf of the kitchen, and never seemed to do anything much – for 360 days of the year anyhow. But once a year a shoot with a bud would appear, and then one morning we would come down and there would be a magnificent red flower with an exquisite

perfume. But it only lasted a day! And then it reverted to its rather dull, prickly existence. Although it was quite an unfriendly plant, nevertheless it still had its place on the window ledge.

And then there's the Mimosa sensitivus. Whereas the cactus will spike you if you come too close, this little plant curls its leaves when you touch it, and even the stem droops a little. It's like a person full of fear and anxiety.

That's why the Bible is full of advice about being tenderhearted, warm and considerate, being conscious of how we treat people who can be just as sensitive as we can be!



We mustn't be like the Arum pictum which grows red poisonous berries. Its other name is Lords and Ladies. There's no room in the church for pride and superiority. The only time we should look down on people is when we are lifting them up!



A little bit of kindness, a little bit of love helps us all to grow, and nowhere is this more true than with the Chinese Lantern – Physalis. When it's growing it has a small whitish flower which the gardening books describe as "insignificant" and not much to look at. But given the warmth of the sun it becomes a spectacular lantern.

Even if we think we're just ordinary with not much to offer, we all have hidden gifts and talents which just need the warmth of encouragement to grow and blossom. And the great thing about the Chinese Lantern is that it can be dried and last a long time.

Many flowers can be dried and kept for arrangements. I often think that they can remind us of those whom we have known and loved and are now gone, but whose influence, goodness and memory continues to live on.

And just one more flower, a favourite of mine, the Passiflora or Passion Flower. It's so called because it has reminders of the passion of Jesus.

The flower is purple, the colour of the season of Lent. The three stigma represent the three nails that held Jesus to the cross. The five anthers, the five wounds of Jesus (hands, feet and side). The filaments remind us of the crown of thorns. The leaves with 3 spikes point to the Holy Trinity, while its vine-like tendrils tell us of God's attachment to the earth!

So, don't only say it with flowers: listen also to what the flowers say to us!
