And the shadow of last year's 275<sup>th</sup> celebrations is the report of November's Vision Day which is included in this month's magazine. And it's not just a report to gather dust in the archives. It is an agenda for the future. Three working groups are spending the next three months looking at how we navigate the future in St Peter's as we seek to be a Community of Welcome, Faith and Service. Please pray for their deliberations as they look at the three areas and navigate how St Peter's can grow inwardly and outwardly in the years ahead. Their suggestions will culminate in an Implementation Day in June and plans finalised for the future.



We continue to pray for the people of Turkey and Syria who have suffered so much after earthquakes devastated their towns and cities. The pictures and reports on our TV screens are harrowing.

Thank you to all who have contributed to the Relief Fund. At the time of writing, £1,044 has been received. Thank you for your generosity.

Thank you, too, to all who have given Easter eggs or money for eggs for the school children of a deprived area of Barrow-in-Furness, Cumbria. We heard of them from a neighbour where our cottage is and I assured her that the people of St Peter's would provide Easter eggs for the 162 children of the school. Most of these children would not receive this little sign of hope if you hadn't helped. Your response has been overwhelming. The target was reached in just a few days! I know they will be much appreciated by the children.

The Revd Sheilagh Williamson has just returned from Uganda where she visited our project in Kalule a number of times. Her report is very encouraging. The school is thriving under the new principal, Agnes. The chicken project is now going well after the hiccups in its operations during Covid and the school has now established a banana plantation in the grounds. The entrance hall to the principal's office has been transformed into a modern reception area. Our pupil support scheme has given hope and much needed support to the neediest children.

Education is their key to the future and is one of the most important things we can do for them. Oh yes, Sheilagh tells us that Agnes is already compiling a list of what a work group can do when we (hopefully) visit in 2024!


The Women's Project also has a chicken project sponsored by us and it, too, is now being productive and profitable. Our financial support for them has given them the incentive to start up small businesses like making clothes and they are now going to open a kitchen to sell food.

Sheilagh will be our special preacher on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> March at 10am and we look forward to hearing all the news from Kalule.



It is wonderful to be part of such a generous community that looks to reach out in love and care to those both near and far. It is a very powerful witness of God's love in action.

And, on the theme of time, we are already in Lent!


#### This Year's Lent Talks in St Peter's

#### **Fair Play**

As this month begins with St David's Day, this article starts with a Welsh phrase, "chwarae teg", which means fair play. The Welsh appear to use this when evaluating something, concluding that everything possible has been done in the best possible way. The idea of fair play has become much discussed due to a new book on the subject which examines moral issues. The development of the principle of fair play came as a consequence of the English need to obey the rules of the game or business. It is often applied to cricket. There is an old tale that in the early 19<sup>th</sup> century the authorities were concerned society had little understanding of religion and so devised cricket to give all an understanding of eternity. In this century it is the West Coast train line that has a similar effect.

The term is sometimes used in peculiar ways. A recent article on theft in East Germany under the communist regime found that although theft was common there appeared to be rules. East Germans were well fed and adequately clothed but lacked goods enjoyed in West Berlin so it was acceptable, or fair play, to steal but not from friends or relatives or those in need. This attitude is common in prisons where prisoners rarely steal from each other but the system is fair game.

Fair play allows for each other to accept that those around us will agree to work together and do the best they can. We make what is called informed judgements where we do all we can to make the best decision and hope when others know about it they will say 'fair play.'

Fair play means we are often giving advice to others. This is always a delicate operation. Robert Runcie wrote in 1981 on his discussions with the Prince and Princess of Wales before marrying them, "My advice was delicately poised between the cliche and the indiscretion." George Harris in 1957 said to students at the start of a new academic year, "I intended to give you some advice but now I remember how much is left over from last year."

A recent article in a newspaper revealed a philosopher stating that to give advice is to trespass on another's integrity, even when they ask for advice. We have all been given advice, however well intentioned, which we can ignore but this does not mean we should not seek to help others or turn away another's help.

The fair play approach is also about hope. St Paul continually refers to hope. He seeks through mutual assistance 'chwarae teg' to support each other and to give hope to others.

The new banana plantation in the school grounds.






Our funds paid for the ladies to have a meal with meat!





## **Vision Day Report**

Throughout the day discussion around the five tables centred on four questions:

- 1. What is the Church for? [What is the purpose of the Church?]
- 2. What does St Peter's do well?
- 3. What St Peter's doesn't do or could do better?
- 4. How might we take things forward?

As each of these questions was explored, the answers to questions 1-3 from each table were recorded on flip charts. Looking at these answers together, after the day itself, it appears that three over-arching themes emerge about what the Church is and therefore what St Peters is trying to express in its life together.

#### These themes were that the Church is:

- A) A Community of Welcome
- B) A Community of Faith
- C) A Community of Service

This led the final table discussions that were recorded on individual sheets collected from each table at the end of the day.

- An awareness of the bridges connecting St Peters being explicit about the good news to people who don't know what is happening
- Help organise/develop parish away days
- Little fishes help improve, continuous improvement, stories/activities
- Involving the opinions of others in that age cohort: ideas/what they want "build it and they will come".



#### The way forward:

One suggestion would be to use the three themes as the basis for discussion about implementing the ideas from the Vision Day. To set up three small, time limited working groups [one for each theme] to discuss how to implement the suggested actions. Then to bring the output from the three groups together to form a coherent plan for future development possibly at a follow-up "Vision Implementation Day".

We recognise that the suggestions of the ways forward do not all fit neatly into just one of the themes. So, groups will need to be aware of where the overlaps are. Part of the purpose of the implementation day would be to enhance suggestions from one group with ideas from another group and combine suggested initiatives to improve them.

#### **FORMBY REFUGEE SUPPORT GROUP**



Welcome to the New Year of **WELCOME DAYS** for asylum seekers to St Peter's Church Hall which starts on March 15<sup>th</sup>. For those who may be reading this for the first time, we invite up to thirteen asylum seekers through our contacts at Asylum Link Merseyside (ALM) to a free meal and time on the beach. If any readers would like to assist with this rewarding and enjoyable "work" by providing food, a listening ear or beach activities please contact Peter.

We also collect good quality clothes for asylum seekers which are distributed by ALM. We are particularly grateful for men's clothes but women's clothes are also welcome. Warm clothing is particularly needed. If you are able to bring clothing to the Parish Hall on Paradise Lane when the Parish Office is open on weekday mornings that is much appreciated, if not, Peter is able to collect from your home.

We are most grateful to the Mothers' Union who collect toiletries (bars of soap, sponges, flannels, tooth brushes, toothpaste, shower gel, shampoo) for us to distribute to our guests when they leave at the end of the afternoon. If you are able to help with this collection there is a box for contributions in the church porch and items may be left there. The porch is open during daylight hours. .

What we do here at St Peter's is only a drop in the ocean compared with all the amazing things that happen at ALM: feeding and housing the destitute, teaching English, advocating work for refugee applications, cycle mechanics, working an allotment, cleaning beaches, planting trees, singing in a choir and many others. If you want to know more there is a copy of the ALM annual Review in the church visit the website - www.asylumlink.org.uk.

Finally, if you have a bicycle that might be no longer needed or is unusable ALM would be pleased to have it. Their mechanics will repair it and it will provide mobility for an asylum seeker who can then join the cycle club! Please let Peter know if you have one and we could collect it and take it to ALM on the 15<sup>th</sup> March.



## From the Back Pew Ted Woods

#### **BLESSING OF SAME-SEX PARTNERSHIPS PASSED**

Meeting in February, General Synod agreed to welcome the proposal of the bishops of the Church of England to provide prayers to bless same-sex partnerships in church.

#### The result of the voting was -

bishops 36 in favour and 4 against with 2 abstentions; clergy 111 in favour and 85 against with 3 abstentions; laity 103 in favour with 92 against with 5 abstentions.

The vote was taken after 8 hours of debate and after 6 years of discussion through the Living in Love and Faith process.

Opposition to the blessing of same-sex couples came from two opposite groups. Firstly, the conservatives who uphold the view that marriage can only be between a man and a woman and that extra-marital sex is condemned in Scripture. Secondly, the motion was opposed by some liberals who want full marriage in church for same-sex partnerships. The former group saying the proposal was going too far, while the latter feel it has not gone far enough.

The bishops' proposal to allow a service of blessing on couples who are in civil partnerships or who have been civilly married was, therefore, a compromise to keep the church together.

By all reports it was not an easy debate and the conclusion was not foregone. There were many amendments proposed all of which were lost except one which stated that there was to be no change in marriage doctrine – that Christian marriage was between one man and one woman.

Part of the bishops' argument was that the proposed prayers would bless same-sex couples as people rather than their relationship – an argument that many have found to be a bit Jesuitical!

The motion passed also included a clause which expressed "lament and repent (ance) of the failure of the Church to be welcoming to LBGTQI+ people and the harm that LBGTQI+ people have experienced and continue to experience in the life of the Church."

The prayers of blessing are now to be finalised by the bishops before July and services of blessing will be available after that date. Clergy will be offered a 'conscience clause' not to perform such services if it goes against their principles and view of Scripture.

However, services of blessing will be available from July in St Peter's for those who wish to have their civil partnerships or marriages blessed in church.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Revd Justin Welby, said that while he "joyfully" welcomed the proposed service, he himself would not conduct such a service due to his position as head of the Anglican Communion where a majority are not in favour. He wanted to remain a figure of unity rather than division.

Indeed, one of the speakers at General Synod, the Archbishop of the Province of Alexandria, and a member of GAFCON a conservative grouping in the Anglican Communion, even though a guest at Synod, spoke against what the bishops were proposing, saying it went against the majority view of churches in the Communion.

In an interesting intervention in the debate, the Archbishop of York, the Most Revd Stephen Cottrell, speaking in favour of the motion, spoke of how doctrines and beliefs develop over time as the Holy Spirit continues to inform and challenge the Church.

Conservatives hold that Scripture cannot be developed in that way, as one of those who opposed the motion put it, "the Church cannot name as holy what has always before now been called a sin."

So much depends not on the authority of Scripture, which is accepted, but how Scripture is to be interpreted.

As the Bishop of Oxford, the Rt Revd Stephen Croft, said about same-sex couples in loving, permanent, faithful and stable relationships, "Their pain and witness has caused me to re-visit Scripture and change my heart and mind."

And speaking personally, it was only as I made a serious study of the passages in the Bible that appear to condemn homosexuality, that I too had a change of heart and mind, and recognised that what was written in Scripture about homosexuality was about power, abuse and paganism rather than loving and stable relationships.

The Bishop of London, Dame Sarah Mullally, who spearheaded the motion through Synod, spoke of the proposed services of blessing as "a moment of hope for the Church." The Archbishops added that this will be "the first time the Church of England publicly, unreservedly and joyfully welcomes same-sex couples in church."
