What is Second-Hand September?



Second Hand September is a moment for all of us to come together to choose a more planet-friendly way to shop.

There was a time when what we wore meant something. It said something about us and our community. But what does it mean today? A throwaway culture? Planet-wrecking waste?

This September, take a stance against the impact of fast fashion by shopping second-hand.

Why Second-Hand September?

Fashion has become one of the most polluting industries on the planet. It's fuelling climate change. Whilst the people who have done the least to cause the climate crisis are being pushed further into poverty.

There's mass-pollution from the production and transportation of clothes. A throwaway culture that leaves millions of clothes in landfill every year. And precious resources like water are being used up. So, by recirculating our clothes – buying, wearing and donating second hand – we can help to reduce the demand. And this can help to reduce the damage to our planet.

Plus, by shopping in charity shops, you're investing in the vital work that they raise money to support.

CURATE'S CORNER

A few thoughts on two months as Deacon.

"Why were you dressed as a Nun last week, but this week you're dressed as a Priest?"

Good question! This was put to me by a member of one of our weekly groups... let me explain, as it is potentially a common thought....



You may have noticed that I often choose to wear a full banded clerical collar which buttons at the back. This decision comes from my understanding that the collar signifies a more 'high Anglican' or indeed traditional Anglican persuasion. It is also a common choice for Episcopal and Lutheran Ministers. For some female religious orders, the white band is indeed part of signifying their dress and commitment to their convent and community.

For me, wearing the full clerical collar is symbolic and a reminder of my ordination and there is something in actively and prayerfully fastening the collar around my neck which is much like a wedding ring.

The more common 'tab' collar is one that is most convenient and rightly so – especially in the hot weather it is certainly more practical and comfortable to wear. I do understand the confusion of seeing this interchanged day by day!

Two months in and I am still adjusting to Deacon life – the clerical visibility and the weekly rhythm of St Peters and community.

A highlight for me has definitely been the Parish summer fair, the enthusiasm and teamwork involved in the day was remarkable and it was fantastic to be introduced to so many people connected with St Peter's, although it is a skill in remembering names (please accept my continued apologies!).

These past two months have brought about extremely sharp emotions for all of us in Merseyside. The community spirit which has been shown is reflective of the love we continue to hold for one another, especially at the times which are difficult and there are no words.

By God's grace, it has and continues to be a joy to jump straight into Parish life and ministry and it is such a privilege to serve here. Particularly in observing and learning from Anne's wisdom and professionalism.

Safeguarding: It's Every Parishioner's Business

Faith communities such as ours at St Peters warmly welcome all people into the life of the church. Jesus commands us to "love one another." In practice this means caring for everyone, treating each other with dignity, thoughtfulness, compassion and love. We see and hear this each week over coffee in the Bier House as people talk to each other, express concern for the sick, celebrate special occasions, worry about absent friends and offer lifts home when needed. Our Christian love for one another also needs to extend to protecting those who are vulnerable to harm, abuse and neglect.

As you are maybe aware over recent years faith communities of all dominations have faced allegations of abuse within their communities and, in some cases, high profile media attention and court cases. Sadly, the Church of England is no exception to this. It is recognised that people who may cause harm to vulnerable children and adults target voluntary organisations, charities and faith groups. As a result, considerable work is being undertaken at the direction of the House of Bishops to develop a consistent, robust safeguarding plan that promotes and maintains a healthy safeguarding culture at national, diocesan and parish level. The safeguarding statement from the House of Bishops document Promoting a Safer Church 2017 says:

"The care and protection of children, young people and vulnerable adults involved in church activities is the responsibility of the whole church. Everyone who participates in the life of the church has a role to play in promoting a safer church for all."

To achieve this the National Safeguarding Standards have been established. These will be used to check what is expected in safeguarding at national, diocesan and parish levels. The standards include a commitment to support the victims and survivors of abuse, respond well to any allegations of abuse and a recognition that safeguarding training and awareness will promote a safer church environment.

Training is mandatory for some such as the clergy, the PCC, leaders of groups for children or vulnerable adults. Safeguarding awareness is recommended for many other roles such as sides people, the coffee teams and gardeners to name a few.

Over the next few months, there will be further opportunities to learn of the progress being made towards the Church of England national safeguarding plan and how the parish will be absorbing the plan in to church life. For example, you might get asked to consider completing the awareness training.

The church is unique; it is open to all people regardless of background and personal history. We only know what people share with each other about their personal lives and backgrounds. This means there may be amongst us people who are victims and/or survivors of neglect and abuse. It is recognised that a focus on safeguarding may cause distress and it may feel uncomfortable if the matter is discussed in church. There is support available from many organisations; the details are available in the Bier House and the magazine.

Jesus didn't shy away from the messiness of life; he mixed with criminals and the ostracised of society. We are reminded at the Eucharist that the invitation to receive comes from God alone; so, we recognise God calls all those who repent; whatever their sins maybe. It may seem distasteful to talk about the possibility of abusers in faith communities but it something we must acknowledge:

"We will take care to identify where a person may present a risk to others and offer support to them whilst taking steps to mitigate such risks." Promoting a Safer Church 2017.

We can't eliminate risk completely in any aspect of life but we can reduce it; the best ways to protect our church, our wider family and community are:

For safeguarding awareness to be an integral part of church life.

To recognise when you are concerned about something you've witnessed or heard and then seeking advice guickly.

In St Peters advice is available from Dave Johnson, the Parish Safeguarding Officer, **\Circ** 07751 056726 or the clergy.

Safeguarding one another from harm does not detract from the joy, certainty, reassurance and fun of a life in Christ: it enhances it.

Just a thought.....

Sadly the number of churches where the bells are rung regularly on a Sunday morning is in decline.



Yet how often do we think about this when Church bells ring to tell the community something special is happening. It may be on Sunday morning when a band of ringers ring for 30 minutes before a service, or a sidesperson tolling just one bell to tell you to hurry along as worship is about to begin. Then there is the Sanctus Bell, the bell that tolls to tell the congregation and the outsider that the bread and wine, the climax of the service, are consecrated. You may also hear the joyful peel of the bells as a newly-wedded couple step out of the church door to start their new life within the community or it may be the steady toll of respect as a coffin is carried out of church.

Whether the bells ring out above the clamour of a busy city or carry across a lonely fell in North Cumbria where only a herdsman and his flock hear it the bells tell people prayer is being offered and God is praised.

A sideways look at how we could....

Revd Jane has The Fair Trade emblem on her stole.


Revd Bev has introduced the charity TWAM to the Fixers and Fettlers of her previous parish, as a Harvest Offering with a difference.

I try to buy Organic and High Welfare produce whenever possible.

Three small contributions to a large and challenging reality.

Fairtrade will give the farmers involved a liveable return on their produce. One Vanilla-pod farmer explained; the with Fair Trade he could afford medicine for both his daughters, whereas before he had to choose between them.

TWAM stands for Tools With A Mission.



Empowering people with tools that create livelihoods and transform lives. "It is a Christian Charity that collects unwanted, useable tools, refurbishes them into trade tool kits and sends them to the developing world." Last year they sent 50 containers.

As part of our Harvest this year, I thought it would be a good idea to ask everyone to search their garages and sheds for unused tools and implements, that could fit these criteria?

My husband John, and I, will collect any donations left in the church porch, throughout September, and transport them to the nearest drop off point at the end of the month.

Buying Organic and High welfare, is an expensive option that not everyone can afford, or anyone can afford all of the time. But like the two above examples doing something in however small a capacity, will have positive results, farmers will be better enabled to practice their industry and vocation in harmony with nature and its current scientific understanding. Increased demand will come to the notice of retailers and supermarkets, more produce will be needed and organic methods will become more widely practised, but only if we do something, however insignificant it might feel.

Making hard choices, wasting less, recycling more are all small contributions we can all try out. Our efforts, like this, offered to God, and through God, this Harvest time, can add to the celebration on Sunday 29th September.

Take Heart and have a good and fruitful Harvest!



The lovely service of celebration on the Sunday afternoon was well-attended and those who were there were able to enjoy the magnificent singing from the combined cathedral choirs.









From the Back Pew Ted Woods

"WHAT IS TRUTH?"

The question that Pontius Pilate asked Jesus two millennia ago was never as relevant as today – "What is Truth?"

In the wake of the horrific stabbings in Southport in July, there were riots and civil disturbances not only in Southport but all over the United Kingdom which were sparked, in the main, by people posting misinformation and lies. One of the first posts gave the perpetrator a false Muslim name, Ali-Al-Shakati, and stated that he was an immigrant who had arrived in a small boat. He was in fact born in Cardiff of Rwandan parents.



Even though the post was deleted later that day it had already sped around the internet and was re-tweeted by many right-wing platforms sparking multiple riots all over the country, even in Northern Ireland.

One disingenuous MP posted a video of himself asking whether "the truth is being withheld" about the Southport attacks and querying the police statement that it was a non-terror incident. But the way the question was asked was enough to sow seeds of doubt about whether the police were telling the truth. It was asked not to seek clarity but to stoke tension.

But it's not just the Southport tragedy. Every day, all over the world, it's becoming increasingly difficult to know "What is truth?"

We are bombarded by news and information. Which belong in the realm of conspiracy theories and which are true? The problem with conspiracy theories is that they contain a kernel of truth but are not the whole truth. In fact, they are very far from the truth.

Out walking with a friend and discussing this subject, he said, "I love walking through the countryside. I can say that that tree or mountain or lake is a fact. But I'm not sure when it comes to news."

In George Orwell's book, 1984, the Ministry of Truth was concerned with news media and propaganda. Its purpose was not to disseminate truth but to re-write history and to distort facts to fit party doctrine. On the front of its glittering white concrete building it stated "War is Peace, Freedom is Slavery, Ignorance is Strength." Orwell rightly predicted an age when truth would be turned upside down and manipulated to sinister ends.

Today we are still at the mercy of misinformation and lies. The difference being that they spread almost instantly on social media.

It's ironic that Donald Trump's media platform is called "Truth Social." It was set up in 2022 after he was banned from major sites such as Facebook and Twitter. Though now, Twitter or X, has, under Elon Musk, re-admitted Trump. Truth Social has 7 million followers but Trump has 89.6 followers on X — 10 million more than YouTube! We should be worried.

The Bible has a lot to say about truth. The 9th commandment states "You shall not bear false witness," and this embraces all sorts of defamation and misrepresentation.

Truth is often spoken about by Jesus. He himself said that he is "the way, the truth and the life." A former Archbishop of York, Stuart Blanch, has written that, for Jesus, truth is not just in opposition to lies but to falsehood at a deeper level, the kind of misinformation that we are subject to today.

Let me end with an old prayer, written by Bishop Westcott, who was bishop of Durham from 1890 – 1901.

"Almighty God, who has sent the Spirit of truth to guide us into all truth, Rule in our lives by your power that we may be truthful in word and deed and thought. Keep us with your gracious protection that no fear or hope may make us false in act or speech. Cast out from us whatever loves or makes a lie, and bring us all into the perfect freedom of your truth; through Jesus Christ our Lord."
