### Dear Friends

Welcome to February, the shortest month of the year, and at one time the last month of the year! Apparently, the Romans had only ten months in their year. They didn't include winter as it was such a dead time with the weather being so cold and no farming being carried out. It was only in the 8<sup>th</sup> century BC that they added on January and February with February having the least number of days to fit into the calendar!

Poor old February! However, to cheer up the people in the shortest month, they had a festival of love called Lupercalia. The bishops of the time, disgusted at the excesses of behaviour during the festival, tried to Christianise it by remembering a martyr called Valentine. It didn't work! Valentine is now associated with love and romance, plus chocolates, roses and cards.

Amidst all the mushiness of February, the more practically minded will be thinking of refreshing their gardens and getting them ready for Spring! It is a wonderful time as we start to see the first signs of growth as the early snow drops and crocuses begin to appear.

But before looking forward, I'd like to look back to Christmas and to say a huge thank you to all who made Christmas such a special time in St Peter's. There was the Christmas Tree Festival which was a wonderful community event and raised money for many charities, the Carol Service, three Christingle services and much more. I don't think we have ever seen so many people enter the doors of St Peter's. Thank you all involved.





Once again the live stream proved it is was worth installing as one lady, who lives some distance, wrote to me. "As a 'streamer' I just want to say how much I enjoy all the services which I watch every week. I thought the services this Christmas starting with the Sunday before Christmas right up to Christmas

Day were outstanding. I've been watching now since Covid and it's great to feel a member of the congregation even if I'm not there in person."

The figures certainly prove it and remember what is recorded is a single view - it doesn't tell us how many are watching in any one house or in the two Care Homes that join our services each week.

In December the Carol Service had 269 views, the Bereavement Service (114), Christmas Day (136), Sunday mornings between 80 and 170, Pet Service (199) and so it goes on. These services are watched by a variety of people for all kinds of reasons and have become a very important part of our outreach. They can be watched live or at a later time and have reached out to families and friends who have not been able to travel for weddings, baptisms and funerals.

Our At Home congregation are very much part of our community, but thank you to Steve, David and Chris who operate the live stream each week to make sure so many feel part of our community.

This year Lent is late – Ash Wednesday is on 5<sup>th</sup> March. There will be more news about our Lent Series next month. Suffice to say that our four Lent Talks will take the form of a Bible study and begin on Monday 10<sup>th</sup> March. Each session will be led by the Revd Canon Liz Shercliff.





In the meantime, there is time for a little light relief in the form of a Quiz Night run by the inimitable John Nelson. John's Quiz Nights are legendary and are always great fun. So, put Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> February at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall into your diaries. See the back cover for details.

In February we also mark Candlemas which celebrates the lengthening of the days as we approach Spring. Snowdrops are sometimes called 'Candlemas Bells' and they are already appearing in the churchyard. There will be a special Service of Light for Candlemas on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> February at 6.30pm.

On another note, we are very sorry to see our neighbour, the Revd Mark Stanford, leaving Holy Trinity & St Michael's in February to take up a post in the Cathedral. Our prayers are with Mark and Sam as they begin this new chapter in ministry. Mark came to Holy Trinity in 2012 and is the longest serving vicar in our deanery. It's a sobering thought that that honour of 'elder lemon' now passes to me! All the other clergy in Sefton North have been appointed since I became Area Dean!

Although the days are lengthening in February, the weather is unpredictable. What is predictable is that the worship, witness and outreach of St Peter's continues as our clergy and people offer a ministry to all which is what makes parish ministry so important.

### What is Confirmation?

Confirmation is a special moment in your journey of faith. ### **NEW ELECTORAL ROLL**

### **Curate's Corner**





# Threads through the Bible – Liverpool Cathedral

Engage and immerse yourself in the biblical story in a way you never have before, through the spectacular silk works of textile artist Jacqui Parkinson.

Threads through the Bible is a culmination of ten years' work, combining three astonishing exhibitions: 'Threads through Creation', 'Threads through the Cross' and 'Threads through Revelation'. In total there will be 38 silk panels, stretching 80 meters in length with more than 25 million stitches!

### **Light to the Gentiles**

So, Christmas 2024 is past. The Church closes the season with the Festival of the Presentation, that story that Luke tells in his Gospel (ch. 2 vv. 22–40) about the meeting of a young family – Joseph, Mary and their first-born son Jesus – with two elderly (for those days) people – Simeon and Anna – in the temple in Jerusalem. The family were fulfilling their religious obligation in the age-old offering of their son to God. Centuries before, however, the horrors of human sacrifice had been commuted by Israel to the offering of an animal or bird, dependent on the wealth of the worshipper, and Joseph and Mary were poor, as Luke indicates, in that they were able to offer only 'either a pair of turtle doves or two pigeons', the cheapest of the offerings.


Luke begins and ends his Gospel in the temple, from the confrontation between Zechariah and the angel ('How can your words be true seeing that I'm too old for parenthood, my wife also?') to the gathering of Jesus' followers, worshipping in the temple after the Ascension, worship being conversation between God and believers, a perfect circle which is the hallmark of the classic tale. The temple represents the cornerstone of faith in Israel's life as a nation, the bedrock of the Church's existence, the platform from which it mover everoutward to bring all peoples into the Kingdom of God. As such, it is the fulcrum on which history tips from promise to fulfilment.

Whereas Zechariah argues with God in the person of the angel, Simeon and Anna, equally elderly, rejoice in the fulfilment of their long-held faith that God's will for mankind should be realised in this small child, Jesus.

Having met with Jesus and his parents, Simeon can die in peace, reassured that the prophecies of the Jewish scriptures on which he has reflected throughout his life are now fulfilled in this child who will attract all peoples to the light cast by God's grace on all who wish to become one with him, the ultimate end of creation. The contemplative attitude of Simeon in its peacefulness contrasts with the exuberant witness to those around her of Anna, widowed at an early age and resident in the temple as part of a community of widows, such a community providing security for one of the most disadvantaged in the Ancient World. For many women, to be widowed reduced them to poverty without the protection of a husband.



So the Feast of the Purification, the Presentation of Christ and Candlemas marks the fulfilling of the Jewish Law and the breaking in of the new era. Anna and Simeon recognised this, and knew that the time had come for them, like John the Baptist, to fade away that the Light of God's love and grace could shine in the world ('He must increase but I must decrease'). Thus the introduction by the Mediaeval Church of candlelight processions, to visually bring the Word to the World.

### **PLEASE NOTE**

St Peter's Church was originally The Ancient Chapelry of Formby, St Peter Apostle and Martyr. It dates from the 12<sup>th</sup> century and was situated very close to the sea. St Peter's was part of the Parish of Walton, which is why the Rector of Walton is still our Patron. This chapel became ruinous and a new church, on the present site, was built in 1746 and consecrated on 19<sup>th</sup> July 1747.

### **Magic Moments at Christmas**

Just before Christmas, and the third Annual Christmas Tree Festival coming to an end at St Peter's, I sat down and reflected on 'magic' moments I have experienced over the many years of ministry.



Our children were just two and four, growing up in a large Vicarage, built by the cotton mill owner, where we had gone to the forest and cut down a tree of suitable size. We had decorated it and finished it off with foil-wrapped chocolates and it was beautifully lit with a new set of lights. On Christmas Eve my wife noticed that one of the chocolates was half-eaten. Our son got the blame and was told to finish it off. In the quiet before the Midnight Service we could hear a rustling and I looked over to the tree. There was the culprit, happily eating another chocolate decoration – such a pretty field mouse and enjoying his Christmas treat. It was, after all, Christmas Eve and so cosy in the Vicarage, but he had to go and go he did with some encouragement from the Vicar (who later apologised to his honest son who had pleaded innocence).

The Annual Carol Service in my country parish was an absolute 'must', with the church beautifully decorated and 'ready' for all. If you were not there in good time you knew you would be standing, but afterwards the celebrations would continue in the Inn alongside, where the Inn-Keeper certainly made room! There was no formal choir, so I would ask for volunteers to sing particular verses. You got to know those who could belt out 'The Farmer's Boy' at Harvest and you would encourage them, despite their wife's objections. As people left, you would hear them: 'That were a good do', and you knew they were happy for another year. We were never without a good turkey. Old Bill made sure of that. The proudest moment of his life was when he presented Her late Majesty, his Landlord The Duke of Lancaster, with a tray of six eggs, free-range from his farm on the fell.

Naples for dear Sue and me began our final five years of ministry – there were 365 churches and they were full of 'presepe', the unique Neapolitan cribs, made by hand all-year-round in one particular area of the city. I have one which we brought home and it is brought out and packed away carefully each year. In Advent each year we would go on a short retreat to Assisi, where St Francis traditionally introduced the 'crib', in which he would place a human child each night – a child without a home – and that child, at his request, would be taken by a family and given a home.

There were three incidents which I can never forget:

a) at the beginning of Advent one year a visitor appeared in Church, one among a regular flow from all over the world. When we reached the moment of the 'Peace' he stepped back and indicated that he did not wish to exchange hands; he did the same the second week and I was ready for his response, but then came a moment during the next week, when the children from the military school were holding their Carol Service. There was our visitor, tears streaming down his face, sitting listening to these natural young voices.

At the end, he stood and applauded and held out his hand to all around. It was then that he explained that he had been auditioning for the lead role at the San Carlo Opera and he had needed to avoid getting an infection – hence his hesitation at the moment of the 'Peace'. He had got the lead role and sang for us in Church!;

- b) the children at the weekly School Assembly came from various N.A.T.O. countries. The Dutch children brought their tradition of Father Christmas sailing into the harbour on 6<sup>th</sup> December, properly dressed and bearing a very full sack of presents they greeted him at the quay-side, singing their most lovely traditional carols;
- c) I would drive across from Naples to Bari, on the Adriatic coast, each month to conduct a Service for English speakers. Christmas was the annual highlight with a Carol Service, some 400 present, held in the Basilica of San Nicola. It was a most beautiful restored building, visited constantly by pilgrims from the east from the time in history when the Latin Church had brought the body west before the Orthodox could get it!. At the next School Assembly I told the children that I had been to the place where 'Father Christmas is buried' oh dear! a sea of faces looking 'enquiringly' at me. What had I done? With some very quick thinking I just about managed to talk my way out of it. Feeling very bad, I spoke to the Head Teacher afterwards, and between us rescued things ...

My last appointment before retirement was in Montreux, from where Canon Paul Ormrod has recently retired. Alongside our own Carol Service, when Anton Mossiman brought us mince pies, we held four more Carol Services in different parts of the Valais: Champerey, Anzere, Villars and Gstaad – attracting up to 1,000 attendees. Gstaad was the most magical by far. The annual Christmas Eve Service involved a train journey through the snows. At the station we were met by a horse-drawn sleigh and carried up to the beautiful Reformed Church, made available to us, and there was a Christmas tree, decorated with lighted candles. At the end the glühwein stall was stocked ready for us; then, it was a return down the mountain to make ready for the Midnight Service.



These have all been 'magic' moments, but it was here in St Peter's this year that we witnessed a wonderful moment. The Christmas Tree Festival was open for the first morning. A group of young men from Peterhouse School arrived with their teachers

(one of the Christmas Trees was decorated by them). One of the students, realising that the microphone was switched on at the lectern, opened the Bible and began to read an 'obscure' Old Testament passage. Then, I moved forward and opened for him the Christmas Gospel and asked him to read. With an articulate voice and 'wordperfect' he told all present: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God . . ."

My magic moments have been in so many places, yet it was here in front of me this year, that it was all so real.

The occasion was a carol service by candlelight, and my particular reason for attending was the group of children from schools across Sefton Borough, joining with St Peter's Choir, in leading the worship.

Since September my colleague
Finlay Gordon has been
introducing primary-aged children
to choral singing as part of the
Cathedral's Schools Singing
Programme. He is a professional
musician, one of the Cathedral's
Lay Clerks, our permanent adult
singers. Sharing the joy and
opportunity of singing is his great
passion. Schools enter a contract
with us to teach some of their
children, and we then invite them
to join a Junior Choir based at a
church nearby.



The Cathedral is working with parishes across the diocese to strengthen and reinvigorate choral music, partly as a way of identifying future Cathedral choristers, but also to point children who might have no church connection to the local church choirs. Squeezed into the porch of the packed St Peter's I was overjoyed to hear one of the Junior Choir children sing the first verse of Once in Royal David's City. What a leap of faith!

A huge thank you to David Holroyd, Rev Lilly Nelson and Rev Canon Anne Taylor and to everyone at St Peter's for your warm support and encouragement. I am very excited to see how we can build on this excellent beginning.

# PRAYER FOR THE MONTH A New Series of Helpful Prayers



This prayer, from the Alternative Service Book, serves as a good prayer for the beginning of a new year. We pray that our faith may be increased and strengthened. Faith is trusting in the presence of God whatever way life treats us and holding fast to his promise to be with us forever. We are also reminded that Christianity is religion of a new start. Recognising and putting behind us whatever mess we may have made, we can start afresh with hope and faith, seeking to live according to God's way, which, of course, is the way of love.





### **MBE FOR FORMER VICAR OF ST PETER'S**

The former Dean of Carlisle, the Very Revd Mark Boyling, was awarded an MBE in this year's New Year's Honours list for services to Carlisle Cathedral.

He oversaw the development of the multi-million Fratry project – an education, events and hospitality space in the cathedral precinct and helped the cathedral to become one of the first to achieve charitable status.



Mark was Vicar of St Peter's from March 1989 to

January 1994, having been personal chaplain to the Bishop of Liverpool, David Shepherd. During Mark's time, the first extension of the Bier House was completed, a link with Markdorf, Germany was established, and with great foresight he set up the St Peter's Educational Trust.

In his history of St Peter's, Neville Carrick records that Mark "impressed the parish by his meticulous organisation of services so that it was not a surprise when he accepted the post of Canon Precentor at Liverpool Cathedral which he took up in January 1994." He later became Dean of Carlisle and retired in 2022 after 18 years in the post.

During his time in St Peter's he married a parishioner, Helen Enoch.

### **Inclusive Church**

As part of our efforts to become a more inclusive church there will now be two bags available in church which contain equipment to be used by people with autism to help them communicate, self-regulate and take part in our services.

ASC (autism spectrum condition) is a condition which affects the way a person processes the world around them. As well as experiencing sensory inputs in a different way to a neurotypical person (sensitivity to sounds, lights or smells), they can also find social interaction to be difficult and a mine-field of misunderstanding. Individuals who are nonverbal or have limited speech often use the PECS (Picture exchange

communication system) to communicate.

Our bags will include a selection of PECS symbols to be used during our services.



There are example sheets for each service along with the symbols which will act as a guide. Individual activity symbols are attached to a blue card to produce a timetable of the events/ activities which take place during a service. As each activity has finished, the symbol is removed and put in the bag with the "finished" symbol on it to indicate it is over and we are on to the next activity.

Each bag contains ear defenders and a selection of fidget toys as well as items to be used for massage or stroking the skin such as the bath glove, scourer and paint brushes. Hand fidgets can help manage anxiety, improve attention/ability to focus, or even help children calm down when dealing with a surge of emotions such as extreme anger or frustration.




# From the Back Pew Ted Woods

### A MODERN PROPHET

One of my favourite authors is Charles Handy. He died in December last. He was one of those people who had an unnerving ability to see future trends in business and society and to pinpoint the essentials in life.

He was the son of an Irish archdeacon and became an oil executive with Shell.

He always thought that his father should have risen higher in the Church and not have stayed so long in his rural parish away from the centre of things.



But when he went to his father's funeral he was moved to the core by the number of people who had come from far and wide not only to attend the service but to line the roads along which the hearse travelled.

It made him re-think his priorities and what was success and to look at life differently.

Indeed, he credited his heritage with enabling him to question the way things were done. "The Irish are trained to be irreverent; we disrespect systems. That allows me to say that just because things have been done this way since William the Conqueror, that's no particular reason they should go on being this way!"

Leaving Shell, he was instrumental in setting up The London Business School, and was then appointed warden of St George's House, Windsor, a think-tank for leaders in business and the church. This was followed by being self-employed as a writer, broadcaster and lecturer. He decided that for six months of the year his work took precedence, and for the other half of the year his wife's work as a photographer took over and he became her assistant.

He was regular speaker on Radio 4's Thought for the Day.

In one of his talks on Thought for the Day he said that there were seven types of intelligence. "There's intellectual intelligence, of course, but also musical intelligence, the creative intelligence, the practical and physical, the social and the psychic... I like to think that we are all intelligent in our own way. No need feel stupid anymore."

In another talk he recalled the less than affluent stipends clergy were given and how budgeting featured in the vicarage he was brought up in. There was a weekly reckoning of accounts to keep track on spending within stipend limits. It was an agony for his mother who could never remember how she had spent her allocation. The young Handy once asked, "Why do we spend so much sometimes on the SPG when we are so poor?" He knew SPG stood for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, a missionary group. "Hush", said his mother, "and never tell your father, but SPG stands for Something, Probably Grub!"

I have a habit of making notes on the blank back pages of books when I come across something I want to remember. It saves a lot of time when I want to look up something.

Here are some from Charles Handy's books:-

The way we walk is more memorable than the way we talk.

Grow better rather than bigger.

Instead of technology and productivity giving us more time for leisure, as we all expected, we seem more consumed by work than ever.

Life without work is a life without point. He then went on to identify 4 types of work – paid work, work in the home (cleaning, cooking, maintenance, etc), gift or voluntary work and study work (in a changing world we cannot rely on what we used to know to see us through the future).

Kings have power. Prophets have principles.

Translating Aristotle's concept of good life: It's not lying on a beach with a glass of wine and a good book but doing your best with what you are best at.

1/2x2x3=3P. Half the workforce, working twice as hard to produce 3 times the output or profit.

I had hoped that the increasing interest in the spiritual life would lead to a more caring society, one that reached out to those on the margins. Instead, the new spirituality seems to be more inwardly looking in personal salvation and renewal, focussed on withdrawing from engagement with outsiders instead of seeking it. It is not religion as I knew it.

We continue to hear of threats to the environment, of forests disappearing, of seas and temperatures rising, but few seemed concerned enough to take action. How can one person change the world, they ask, and pass by.

And there are lots more!
